

Pet Taxi Takes Jack on Ride of his Life

When Brenda Abayomi's brindle-coated pit bull developed a life-threatening case of bladder stones, the Chicago resident feared the worst.

After her local vet estimated the cost of Jack's surgery at \$4,000, Abayomi reluctantly called an animal shelter to place her beloved pet with an owner who could afford to save him. "All I could think was that my poor dog was going to die, what could I do?" she recalled. "I was just thinking the worst."



Instead, the animal shelter alerted her to programs available to help with Jack's care and, to Abayomi's relief, KodiakCare and CRISP [Chicagoland Rescue Intervention and Support Program] teamed up to fund the surgery. There was just one hitch: The 82-pound pup had to be transported to the veterinarians in suburban Countryside, Illinois, who were standing by to care for him. Abayomi, who has no vehicle herself or means to get to hospital, was pointed to help through a pet-taxi service. Soon Jack was on his way, arriving promptly after a 30- to 40-minute ride.

Jack pulled up in the pet taxi not a minute too soon, as his condition had left him in severe distress, according to Dr. Monica Capolongo, one of his caregivers at Countryside Veterinary Center. "He was blocked, dribbling a little, but not urinating normally," she said. "X-rays showed his bladder was just full of stones and he also had a few stones in his urethra. He needed surgery right away."

The surgical team worked fast, inserting a catheter, opening the bladder, clearing it of pebble-sized stones and flushing it multiple times to ensure no future blockages. The surgeons also neutered him, as intact dogs are more prone to re-occurrences.

In recovery, Jack developed a fluid-filled scrotal sac that required an additional pet-taxi ride to the hospital for several days of medication and laser therapy. "We deal with clients who only have enough money for certain things, to be able to make it reasonable enough for them to afford it," Dr. Capolongo said. "It's great when we can do the work."

"Doing what you do is super-helpful," Capolongo said of KodiakCare. "I'm grateful. It keeps me from making difficult decisions."

As of January, Jack was thriving, his owner said. "He's definitely doing much better," Abayomi said. "He's a big baby.
